

Since 1980, **SHORTSTOP** has set thousands of youth offenders back on the right path before they have strayed too far. This unique juvenile crime diversion program provides a cost-effective alternative to prosecution and utilizes science-based models for reducing delinquency among youth. By completing SHORTSTOP, youth are able to move forward in a positive direction, without serving jail time or having a criminal record.

SHORTSTOP works to break the cycle that turns youth into repeat offenders. It's a wake-up call that has proven to be extremely successful. In fact, studies show that alternatives to detention are not only cost-effective, but they are much more effective than incarceration at facilitating long-term behavior changes. SHORTSTOP is an integral part of larger system reform, acting as a key stakeholder on Juvenile Detention Alternative Initiative efforts in Orange County. Its success has positioned Project Youth OCBF as a leader, not only in Southern California but throughout the nation, in providing successful youth diversion programs that are replicable state and nationwide.



Studies show that unless youth are taught the consequences of crime early, their crimes will escalate. This holds true in Orange County, where 69% of juvenile probationers go on to break the law again. All youth are at risk for delinquency, but our Latino youth are particularly vulnerable. While Latinos represent 49% of Orange County's youth, they account for nearly 80% of all convicted juveniles and 94% of youth gang members.



The importance of early intervention programs is indisputable. To meet these needs, SHORTSTOP partners with the Orange County Probation Department, local police departments and school districts to reach out early to at-risk youth early, to prevent youth delinquency from escalating into chronic criminal behavior.



The overwhelming success of SHORTSTOP is due, in large part, to mandatory parental participation. Together, first-time juvenile offenders and their parents participate in diversion sessions led by volunteer attorneys and legal professionals. SHORTSTOP is provided in English and Spanish by bilingual, bicultural staff. Services include:





### Two 4-hour Program Sessions

Program sessions are held in a courtroom and include a visit to the holding cell, presentations from paroled convicts, a trial simulation, and numerous family strengthening exercises.

Sessions focus on providing legal education, including parents' legal rights and responsibilities; promoting personal responsibility; and increasing protective factors, such as parental monitoring, self control, peer refusal skills, school bonding, and participation in pro-social activities.

### Mandatory Homework Assignments

Another critical part of SHORTSTOP is what happens at home. Homework assignments include reading legal education materials, interviewing a working professional in the community to explore future career paths, and completing family communication exercises and goal-setting assignments.

#### Restorative Justice Plan

An individualized plan is created for each youth that includes financial restitution, victim apology letters, and community service.

## Case Management and Referral Services

As needed, youth and families are referred to additional mental health, family therapy, or other wrap-around services.



Evaluation studies show that SHORTSTOP makes a measurable difference in the lives of local youth and families and to the well-being of our community. The results of our most recent recidivism study with the Orange County Probation Department indicate that 94% of our program participants are successfully diverted from the legal system for at least one year.

Youth like Mateo\* know just how life-changing SHORTSTOP can be. Recently, Mateo called Project Youth OCBF to apply for an internship. He explained why an internship in SHORTSTOP would mean so much to him. Seven months prior, he'd attended the program after being caught spraying graffiti on street signs with his tagging crew.

"Ever since I went through SHORTSTOP, I've known that I wanted to work with teens that were caught up like I was. I know that if I hadn't got caught, I would be kickin' it with the wrong group. Some of my closest friends then are now in the gang that was recruiting us. Because of SHORTSTOP, my life is going in a different direction," he said.

Since completing the program, Mateo has graduated from high school and enrolled at Golden West College. He plans to transfer to a four-year university to study criminal justice. "I just needed someone to tell me that I could make it. That's what SHORTSTOP did ... it gave me confidence."
