

Since 1980, SHORTSTOP has set thousands of youth offenders back on the right path before they have strayed too far. This unique juvenile crime diversion program provides a cost-effective alternative to prosecution and utilizes science-based models for reducing delinquency among youth. By completing SHORTSTOP, youth are able to move forward in a positive direction, without serving jail time or having a criminal record.

SHORTSTOP works to break the cycle that turns youth into repeat offenders. It's a wake-up call that has proven to be extremely successful. In fact, studies show that alternatives to detention are not only cost-effective, but they are much more effective than incarceration at facilitating long-term behavior changes.

SHORTSTOP is an integral part of a larger system reform, acting as a key stakeholder on Juvenile Detention Alternative Initiative efforts in Orange County. Its success has positioned Project Youth OC as a leader, not only in Southern California but throughout the nation, in providing successful youth diversion programs that are replicable state and nationwide.

# SHORTSTOP is not a scared straight program.

While program sessions begin by giving youth a realistic view of the criminal justice system, the primary focus is to help youth gain critical legal education, plan for a brighter future, and strengthen family bonds.

### Intake

The two-hour clinical intake assessment gathers valuable information about the youth's at-risk behaviors, emotional stability, subatance use, impact of COVID-19, family dynamics, and school functioning.

### Sessions

Two program sessions (four-hours each) are held in a courtroom and/or at the Project Youth OC office. They include a visit to the holding cell; presentations from wards from the Youth Guidance Center; a trial simulation; and legal education presentations, including parents' legal rights and responsibilities. The majority of the time is devoted to developing youth protective factors: communication and conflict resolution skills, peer refusal and problem-solving skills, self-control, school connectedness, participation in pro-social activities, personal responsibility, and parental monitoring.

### **Assignments**

Another critical part of SHORTSTOP is what happens at home. Mandatory assignments include reading legal education materials, interviewing a working professional in the community to explore future career paths, engaging in family communication exercises and completing goal-setting and other writing assignments.

## Case Management and Referral Services

As needed, youth and families are referred to additional mental health, family therapy, or other wrap-around services.

# our impact

Evaluation efforts have proven that SHORTSTOP makes a measurable difference in the lives of at-risk youth. We are proud to report that 96% of participating youth do not recidivate within a year of completing the program. Additional program outcomes include:

increase in youth desire to attend college or trade school

63% increase in youth peer refusal skills

88% improvement in parent/child communication

91% improvement in parental monitoring

80% reduction in child acting out/fighting

96% of parents would recommend SHORTSTOP to another parent
